A show curated by the 41st annual Harrison Festival of the Arts. Details to be announced.




Mallory Donen August 3 - 25

Notes from the Artist in Residence

I've just come in from a long bike ride to the sandy cove trailhead and back. The rain has let up for an hour, and I know that I need to jump on these brief windows of time where the rain pauses its pounding if I am to get out at all! I've been enjoying getting out in nature as much as being in the studio. It was one of the reasons I was drawn to this residency. My first four months as the Artist-In-Residence has been busy. My lesson has been, *don't underestimate the settling-in period needed here*. The lake is like a satellite for deep dreaming. I was back and forth to Victoria in September and October for my two successful solo shows.



November and December have been about hibernating and working on encaustic monotypes. Encaustic monotypes are single, original prints created on a heated pallet (in this case an anodized aluminum plate on an electric griddle) with coloured beeswax and then lifted onto a piece of paper. I taught a class to a small group of eager

students in November, and I have had requests to teach it again. This will happen in February, 2019.

Encaustic monotypes are my warm-ups. They are about playing with colour and pattern and texture and having no expectations of the outcome. Since I need a lot of time to percolate on an idea, I have been so grateful for this time to think about my ideas for work I want to create for my June show. Although I am primarily an encaustic (beeswax) painter, I also work with mixed media and photography. It was great to have an open studio event on December 14 at the Members' Group Show reception and have some feedback on my ideas in process on what I am calling, "Looking at People Looking at Animals" and deconstructing natural history. I look forward to what the next nine months has in store.

Workshops

The Arts Council will again be offering a number of workshops during 2019. Below are a few that are confirmed but keep an eye out for others that are currently in the planning stages.

Oil Painting Workshop - last October portrait artist Angela Burton did a very successful workshop. She will repeat the workshop at the Agassiz Library on Saturday, February 9.

World of Words - an annual partnership between the Arts Council and the Agassiz Library. Saturday, March 9 at the Agassiz Library. **Cyanotype Printing -** learn from Artist in Residence Aileen Penner to print using the sun! A unique and versatile process, Cyanotypes can also be created from handmade negatives, drawings, or digitally produced negatives. We will use botanicals and objects you bring to make hand made negatives in a relaxed fun environment. Saturday, May 4 at the Ranger Station Art Gallery.

Resistance, Resilience and Adaptation - in conjunction with her October Gallery show Sylvie Roussel-Janssens will offer a drop in session where participants of all ages can do some collage and/or fabric burning on precut fabric pieces. Saturday, October 19.

continues to grow. The variety and quality of the artwork submitted by KHAC members keeps getting better and better, and is a testament to the artistic talent to be found within our local communities.

Many thanks to those who provided refreshments, Aileen for sharing insights into her work and giving us a glimpse of her workspace, Marina for graciously volunteering her time to entertain us and a special thank you everyone who attended – it all added up to create a "gala gala" event! If you have not yet had an opportunity to see "The KHAC Members' Show", we encourage you to plan a visit soon. The show will remain on display in the Gallery until mid February, at which time the Gallery will close for two weeks for the annual maintenance and repairs required to keep it "bright & white". Until then, the Gallery will be open from 10:00am – 4:00 pm weekdays, and closed on weekends.

Winter Solstice Wishing Boat Workshop

On December 21st almost thirty people took part in our community involvement event – the "Wishing Boat Workshop".

Given that this was the day of the Winter Solstice, it seemed appropriate to host an event to contemplate the past and look forward to a new season and year.



Participants were led through the process of constructing origami boats on which they wrote the things from the previous year they wished to "let go of", as well as their hopes for things to come in the New Year.

The boats were then decorated, sails and tealights were attached, and the bottom of the boats were coated with wax to help them float.

At dusk everyone walked down to the edge of the lagoon to release their boats, and send their hopes and dreams across the water. There were a few exciting moments when a few sails caught fire, but the majority of the boats made it across to the far side of the lagoon.
